Reports of the United Hebrew Charities of New York show that during February applications were received numbering 6,372, representing about 12,000 individuals. Of these 4,691 were in the Bureau of Relief. Relief was not given for sufficient reasons in 1,874 cases. Regular monthly allowances were given in 111 cases and included in the number of applications here given. In the Employment Bureau there was a total registry of 381 applicants. Work was found for 246. Shortages for the month were \$2,402, 31, and disbursements for relief were \$1,943.22.
